Our approach intersects the potentialities of the creative industries, repair and restoration, circular economy, social enterprise and vocational training opportunities. We strengthen skills and provide training for vulnerable Australians from diverse backgrounds to build self-reliance and entrepreneurship through local community-driven solutions.

We engage with young people, artists, craftspeople, sector leaders, universities, tradespeople, schools, youth justice, government, service organisations, families and the local community in order to create networks and partnerships for strategic and critical change. 

DIRECTORS' REPORT

THE DIRECTORS PRESENT THIS REPORT TOGETHER WITH THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS ON THE COMPANY FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023.

THIS REPORT DEMONSTRATES THE AGILITY, INNOVATION AND DEDICATION OF THE TEAM AND OUR STAKEHOLDERS, FUNDING PARTNERS, ADVISORS AND COMMUNITY TO ENSURE THAT TESTIMONY ARTS CONTINUES TO SUPPORT THE CHANGING AND GROWING NEEDS OF YOUNG PEOPLE.

Whilst we all continue to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, 2022 saw Maryborough hit by two floods between January and April. The flood events caused significant damage to about 100 roads in the region and left the Fraser Coast Council with a bill close to \$15 million.

In the first month of the 2023-24 financial year came the shocking news that the federal police had charged a Gold Coast 45-year-old childcare worker with 1,623 sexual abuse offences against 91 children.

There has never been a more critical time for programs that build connection, community, and creativity because we need to shift the dial now more than ever.

In 2018, Tammy Brennan, a passionate multidisciplinary artist, agitator, cultural strategist and changemaker returned home to the South East QLD region from Sydney and became curious about creative repair and its intersectionality of professional artists and crafts people. Tammy worked with Dr Guy Keulemans at UNSW during his Australian Research Council (ARC) application and was introduced to Dr Eleni Kalantidou by Keulemans in late 2020 as Brennan's creative interest and approach was aligned with Kalantidou's practice which encompassed community and repair.

A long-standing professional partnership between Brennan and Kalantidou commenced with them undertaking a scoping a pilot program focused on creative repair practices, social enterprise for regional communities and community building for at risk youth, as a method to address social exclusion. What followed was an extensive community and sector consultation across the Fraser Coast region with a key focus on Maryborough.

In 2020 Brennan secured funding from the Queensland Government, Queensland Arts Showcase Program (2020) to enable the Transformative Repair for Social Change pilot initiative,

Brennan identified a need to assist socially excluded young people in regional QLD communities and the pilot program was designed to identify whether the arts, circular economy and community building approaches to re-engage young people could be successful.

The pilot program was delivered over 6 months in 2021 and aimed to establish through a place-based approach and active research and co-design, whether an interest and participation in community life through hands-on trans-generational learning and training could support early school leavers to become pro-social and build work employment readiness.

The co-designed evaluation of the pilot led to the creation of the Toolkit for Upskilling At-Risk Youth in Regional Queensland, supported by an Arts, Education and Law Grant (2021) from Griffith University acquired by Dr Eleni Kalantidou.

Following the success of the pilot, Brennan and Kalantidou recognised that the outcomes of the pilot would not be able to become sustainable only through the support of arts funding. It was at this time Tammy Brennan founded Testimony Arts Ltd.

In late 2021, Tammy Brennan brought Kieren Grassmayr, Dr Guy Keulemans and Ben Hughes together to establish Testimony Arts Ltd to grow the vision and work of Brennan and Kalantidou.

Ben Hughes was appointed as Company Secretary and Kieren Grassmayr as Chairperson on 20 June 2022. Tammy Brennan was appointed to the role of Managing Director on 31 August 2022.

With the guidance and inputs of Brennan and Kalantidou from the pilot findings, Testimony Arts was successful in securing two year funding under Strong and Resilient Communities (SARC) funding program, through Department of Social Services (DSS).

The Toolkit for Upskilling At-Risk Youth in Regional QLD

"The Toolkit is designed for regional communities, organisations and practitioners that want to contribute to the supporting and mentoring of young men and women who have been involved with, or are at risk of being involved in the youth justice system and at high risk of social exclusion, by getting them engaged in creative repair practices."

The SARC funding has enabled a strong growth cycle following the pilot, and has enabled a clear distinction between the pilot program, Transformative Repair for Social Change (TRSC), and the Testimony Arts SARC funded Creative Industries, Social Enterprise and Repair and Restoration (CISERR) Initiative.

The Maryborough Creative Industries, Social Enterprise, Repair and Restoration (CISERR) Initiative is a program for young people aged 15 to 18 years, who are either disengaged from mainstream learning opportunities due to unresolvable high school disciplinary absence, and/or at risk of entering the youth justice system in regional QLD.

Testimony Arts delivers CISERR which is aimed at developing skills, building capacity around social and economic participation readiness for young people aged 15 to 18 years, who identify as male. The program is bespoke and agile and utilises a mentor-led approach with a focus on building soft skills, resilience and creative problem solving.

2022 to 2023 has seen over 220+ hours of hands-on applied learning experiences provided to 28 young people who met the CISERR criteria in Maryborough, regional, QLD.

As we look to 2024, we are grateful that we continue to work together to achieve our goals to support young people to strive and thrive in their community.

CREATIVE INDUSTRIES, SOCIAL ENTERPRISE, REPAIR AND RESTORATION (CISERR) INITIATIVE

The Creative Industries, Social Enterprise, Repair and Restoration (CISERR) Initiative re-engages young people and introduces them to the arts, social enterprise and circular economy by working with service organisations, the local community, high schools and local and state government agencies to collectively develop a network of supportive relationships.

CISERR was structured around being an engagement and education tool by focusing on four main areas of identified disadvantage, established through the pilot study.

The selection process of the youth participants was based on their age and gender (Indigenous and non-Indigenous young men aged 15-19), being disengaged from school, and possibly having some interaction with the youth justice system.



ACHIEVEMENTS



FUNDERS 2022 - 2023

Testimony Arts secured \$360,000 in funding from the Australian Government Department of Social Services to support the delivery of the CISERR initiative from 2022 to 2024.

The organisation received \$100,000 in project funding from Creative Australia in June 2023 to support activities into 2024.
