Principal activities

Firstdraft is a national artist led organisation that creates an environment for artists to imagine the expanded possibilities of visual art practices. Our sustainable model of governance allows us to champion risk and encourage ambition in a professional gallery context. With artists, curators and writers at our centre we foster a diversity of practices, people and programs that epitomise excellence and contribute to dynamic local and global discourse.

Firstdraft's artistic activities fall into five broad categories: Exhibitions, Curators', Writers', Public Programs, and Outreach. The Exhibition, Curators', and Writers' Programs are administered via open call every six months to populate the following six months of programs. This short-lead model is vital to respond to rapid changes in emerging practice and allow early-career artists to realise ideas in a timely manner. Public Programs and Outreach are responsive and programmed by-invitation of the Firstdraft directorate to ensure a range of practices and demographics are represented.

Firstdraft is a national leader in presenting emerging visual arts practices and is a training ground for the next generation of cultural practitioners in the visual arts sector through both its program and its management. Firstdraft strives for artistic excellence, presenting the best work sourced nationally, across the full expanse of contemporary visual arts. We see ourselves as a national leader in developing a sustainable artist-run initiative (ARI) model that attracts significant support from its communities. We support our programming with a critical dialogue that encourages audiences to access and understand the work we present and create a national conversation around emerging art and artists.

Operating result

The surplus for the year amounted to \$28,160 (2016; Surplus \$37,261).

Review of Operations

In 2017 Firstdraft welcomed back directors Jana Hawkins-Andersen, Georgia Hobbs, Peter Johnson, Brigit Moran, Jade Muratore and Kathleen Winten and newly instated directors Margaret Brink, Justin Youseff, Tian Zhang and Tahjee Moar on 1 January 2018. The new board members replaced the outgoing directors Flora Grant and Emily O'Connor who finished their tenure with the gallery on 31 December 2017.

For 30 years, Firstdraft has continued to run a sustainable governance model whilst working towards greater professionalisation of the organisation through employing a full-time General Manager and continuing to work with an Advisory Board, who supports the rotating management board. In 2017, Firstdraft added a 20 hour per week Program Officer position to its staff, a role that undertakes communications, gallery maintenance and program support. This position was made possible as a result of increased funding from ArtsNSW for the 2017 to 2018 triennium.

The 2017 Advisory Committee consisted of Philip Kier, Lisa Havilah, Steven Miller and James Roland who provided expertise and guidance in the areas of philanthropy, arts management, finance and law.

Firstdraft has a strong volunteer program which supports the organisation's operations and provides vital professional development opportunities for artists and arts administrators. Currently there is an established team of 30 volunteers. Firstdraft undertook recruitment for volunteers in 2017 and received a very positive response.

In 2017 Firstdraft continued to offer free shows to artists. This initiative was able to continue given the success of the annual fundraising auction. Free exhibitions have increased the professionalism of artists, encouraged experimentation and reduced artists' financial burden to exhibit. It has increased the number of applications received and the quality of these applications, particularly from interstate artists which has strengthened and ensured our national profile as the leading Australian artist-led organisation.

In 2017 Firstdraft was able to provide a bursary to artists from regional NSW and Western Sydney, supported by ArtsNSW. This fund also supported Directors and staff to travel to regional NSW to undertake outreach and engagement activities.

Fundraising

Firstdraft has established its Annual Auction as a successful model of fundraising - in 2017, the event raised \$55,400 (net) and provided over \$12,800 in artist commissions. We have also sold works by emerging artists into major collections: James Roland, Dr Dick Quan, Pat Corrigan, Michael Hobbs, Steven Miller, Clinton Ng, Lisa Paulsen, Lisa Havilah, and Artbank.

Funding:

The organisation received funding support from the City of Sydney (CoS), Create NSW and the Australia Council for the Arts. In 2017 Firstdraft was supported by CoS through its Accommodation Grant Program, project funding for our public programs (\$15,000), capital investment in the gallery building exceeding \$100,000, and has built on strong relationships with the Creative City team.

In 2017 Firstdraft received \$130,000 in multi-year funding from Create NSW for organisational operations. Firstdraft also received multi-year funding from the Australia Council of \$110,000 the first instalment of an agreement until 2020.

Exhibition Program

In 2017 the exhibition program began on 11 January and over the year presented the work of 75 individual artists, collaborations or groups. Each artist was shown for four weeks in one of four galleries

Curators' Program

The Firstdraft Curators' Program is an initiative to support emerging practitioners and experimental exhibition-making. Firstdraft Curators' Program is a core element of Firstdraft programming with three shows annually dedicated to ambitious exhibition by emerging curators. Firstdraft encourages curators to work with emerging artists for their exhibitions, however also accepts proposals that bring emerging artist's work into conversation with more established peers. In 2017 Firstdraft presented curatorial projects from Kate Britton, Talia Smith, Denise Thwaites, Emily McDaniel, and Ohni Neon.

Public Programs

In 2017, Firstdraft undertook seven major public programs: three Live Performance Nights that activate the gallery after hours and provide Firstdraft the opportunity to present live art in its unique premises in one-off programs curated by artists and curators; and four 'Around the Outside' events, which provide platforms for the discussion and debate of current issues in contemporary artistic practice, as well as being a reflexive space where current sector issues can be explored with our community.

Extending across art forms and with a focus on diversity, Firstdraft's Public Programs engaged and supported experimental practice and practitioners and work to foster a vibrant arts community and discourse. In 2017, Firstdraft hosted 12 evenings of artists talks showcasing at least 4 artists at each, school group tours, and conducted lectures at universities

Writers' Program

The Firstdraft Writers' program acknowledges and explores the role of text and language in understanding and sharing experiences of art and will expand the forms of practice presented by the gallery. The Firstdraft Writers' program supported four emerging writers in 2017 for a three-month residency each. Participants are selected through open call application rounds by submitting a proposal to create new work, applicants are selected by Firstdraft's Directorate and will be afforded opportunities to realize their works in both the exhibition or public programs stream as appropriate to their application. 2017 participants were: Emma Size, Emily Stewart, Vincent Silk, Hana Aoake & Callum Devlin and Sarinah Masukour.

Outreach

Further embedding Firstdraft in the cultural conversation regionally, nationally and internationally is a key focus of the organisation over the next five years. In 2017, Firstdraft undertook completed a partnership with Cementa, supporting artist Paris Norton, who will subsequently exhibit at Firstdraft. Two new major partnerships were developed: a three-way partnership with Next Wave and ACE Open to support artist Elyas Navi to exhibit with all three partners; and with Goulburn.art Regional Gallery, supporting artist Jodie Whalen to undertake a three-week socially engaged residency in the Goulburn region.

Firstdraft has taken up smaller opportunities for collaboration and outreach as they arise, including the General Manager speaking at a Create NSW Road Show in Wagga Wagga, and hosting a NAVA industry panel on 23 May 2017. Firstdraft has also actively participated All Conference, the new network and advocacy body for artist-run initiatives.

In 2015 Firstdraft received philanthropic funds from the Keir Foundation in support of international outreach. This grant funded two Firstdraft directors to undertake a research trip in 2016. Subsequently in early 2017, UK-based collective Auto Italia South East held a week-long workshop with local artists, which culminated in a two-night performance event.

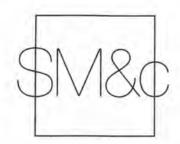

1 General information and statement of compliance

The financial report includes the financial statements and notes of First Draft Incorporated.

These financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.

First Draft Incorporated is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2017 were approved and authorised for Issuance by the Committee members.

2 Changes in accounting policies

2.1 New and revised standards that are effective for these financial statements

AASB 2015-6 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Extending Related Party Disclosures to Not For-Profit Public-Sector Entities. AASB 2015-6 amends AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures to extend the scope of that Standard to include not for-profit public-sector entities. Key disclosures required under the amendments for not-for-profit public-sector entities include:

- · Identification of key management personnel (KMP);
- · KMP compensation; and
- · Identification of related parties and transactions with those related parties

AASB 2015-6 is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2016. The adoption of these amendments has not had a material impact on the company.

AASB 2015-7 makes amendments to AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement to exempt not-for-profit public-sector entities from certain requirements of the Standard. The amendments were made to provide relief for not-for-profit public-sector entities from making certain disclosures about the fair value measurement of assets within the scope of AASB 116 Property, Plant and Equipment which are primarily held for their current service potential rather than for the purpose of generating future cash flows.

AASB 2015-7 is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2016. The adoption of these amendments has not had a material impact on the company.

AASB 2016-2 is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2017. The adoption of these amendments has not had a material impact on the Company. AASB 2016-4 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Recoverable Amount of Non-Cash-Generating Specialised Assets of Not-for-Profit Entities. This Standard amends AASB 136 Impairment of Assets to:

- Remove references to depreciated replacement cost as a measure of value in use for not-forprofit entities; and
- Clarify that the recoverable amount of primarily non-cash-generating assets of not-for-profit
 entities, which are typically specialised in nature and held for continuing use of their service
 capacity, is expected to be materially the same as fair value determined under AASB 13 Fair
 Value Measurement, with the consequence that:
 - AASB 136 does not apply to such assets that are regularly revalued to fair value under the revaluation model in AASB 116 Property, Plant and Equipment and AASB 138 Intangible Assets; and
 - AASB 136 applies to such assets accounted for under the cost model in AASB 116 and AASB 138.

AASB 2016-7 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards - Deferral of AASB 15 for Not-for-Profit Entities AASB 2016-7 amends the mandatory effective date of AASB 15 for not-for-profit entities so that AASB 15 is required to be applied by such entities for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019 instead of 1 January 2018

AASB 2016-7 is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2017. The adoption of these amendments has not had a material impact on the company.

AASB 2017-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards - Further Annual Improvements 2014-2016 Cycle This Standard clarifies the scope of AASB 12 Disclosure of Interests in Other Entities by specifying that the disclosure requirements apply to an entity's interests in other entities that are classified as held for sale, held for distribution to owners in their capacity as owners or discontinued operations in accordance with AASB 5 Noncurrent Assets Held of Sale and Discontinued Operations

AASB 2017-2 is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2017. The adoption of these amendments has not had a material impact on the company.

3 Summary of accounting policies

3.1 Overall considerations

The significant accounting policies that have been used in the preparation of these financial statements are summarised below.

The financial statements have been prepared using the measurement bases specified by Australian Accounting Standards for each type of asset, liability, income and expense. The measurement bases are more fully described in the accounting policies below.

3.2 Revenue

Revenue comprises revenue from the sale of goods, services income, government grants, fundraising activities and client contributions. Revenue from major activities and services is shown in Note 4.

Revenue is measured by reference to the fair value of consideration received or receivable by the Association for goods supplied and services provided, excluding sales taxes, rebates, and trade discounts.

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably, collection is probable, the costs incurred or to be incurred can be measured reliably, and when the criteria for each of the Association's different activities have been met. Details of the activity-specific recognition criteria are described below.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods comprises revenue earned from the sale of goods donated and purchased for resale. Sales revenue is recognised when the control of goods passes to the customer.

3.2 Revenue continued

Government grants

A number of the Association's programs are supported by grants received from the Federal, State and Local governments. If conditions are attached to a grant which must be satisfied before the Association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue is deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Where a grant is received on the condition that specified services are delivered, to the grantor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction. Revenue is recognised as services are performed and at year-end until the service is delivered.

Revenue from a non-reciprocal grant that is not subject to conditions is recognised when the Association obtains control of the funds, economic benefits are probable, and the amount can be measured reliably. Where a grant may be required to be repaid if certain conditions are not satisfied, a liability is recognised at year end to the extent that conditions remain unsatisfied.

Where the Association receives a non-reciprocal contribution of an asset from a government or other party for no or nominal consideration, the asset is recognised at fair value and a corresponding amount of revenue is recognised.

Donations and bequests

Donations collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the Association gains control, economic benefits are probable, and the amount of the donation can be measured reliably.

Bequests are recognised when the legacy is received. Revenue from legacies comprising bequests of shares or other property are recognised at fair value, being the market value of the shares or property at the date the Association becomes legally entitled to the shares or property.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method.

3.3 Operating expenses

Operating expenses are recognised in surplus or deficit upon utilisation of the service or at the date of their origin.

3.4 Intangible assets

Recognition of other intangible assets:

Acquired intangible assets

Website construction costs are capitalised on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and install the specific website.

Subsequent measurement

All intangible assets are accounted for using the cost model whereby capitalised costs are amortised on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives, as these assets are considered finite. Residual values and useful lives are reviewed at each reporting date. In addition, they are subject to impairment testing as described in Note 3.14. The following useful lives are applied:

Website: 33% pa

3.4 Intangible assets continued

Subsequent expenditures on the maintenance of computer software, brand names and website are expensed as incurred.

When an intangible asset is disposed of, the gain or loss on disposal is determined as the difference between the proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in surplus or deficit within other income or other expenses.

3.5 Property, plant and equipment

Leasehold improvements, plant and other equipment

Leasehold improvements, plant and other equipment (comprising office furniture and equipment) are initially recognised at acquisition cost or manufacturing cost, including any costs directly attributable to bringing the assets to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the Association' management.

Leasehold improvements, plant and other equipment are subsequently measured using the cost model, cost less subsequent depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised on a straight-line basis to write down the cost less estimated residual value of leasehold improvements, plant and other equipment. The following useful lives are applied:

Office equipment: 20% pa
 Office furniture: 20% pa
 Computer equipment: 20% pa
 Leasehold improvements: life of lease

In the case of leasehold property, expected useful lives are determined by reference to comparable owned assets or over the term of the lease, if shorter.

Material residual value estimates and estimates of useful life are updated as required, but at least annually.

Gains or losses arising on the disposal of property, plant and equipment are determined as the difference between the disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets and are recognised in surplus or deficit within other income or other expenses.

3.6 Leases

Operating leases

Where the Association is a lessee, payments on operating lease agreements are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Associated costs, such as maintenance and insurance, are expensed as incurred.

3.7 Income taxes

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

3.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and demand deposits, together with other short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

3.9 Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are benefits, other than termination benefits, that are expected to be settled wholly within twelve (12) months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. Examples of such benefits include wages and salaries, non-monetary benefits and accumulating sick leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the undiscounted amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The association's liabilities for long service leave are included in other long-term benefits as they are not expected to be settled wholly within twelve (12) months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. They are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. The expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on high quality corporate bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the timing of the estimated future cash outflows. Any re-measurements arising from experience adjustments and changes in assumptions are recognised in profit or loss in the periods in which the changes occur.

The association presents employee benefit obligations as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve (12) months after the reporting period, irrespective of when the actual settlement is expected to take place.

Post-employment benefits plans

The association provides post-employment benefits through defined contribution plans.

Defined contribution plans

The association pays fixed contributions into independent entities in relation to several state plans and insurance for individual employees. The association has no legal or constructive obligations to pay contributions in addition to its fixed contributions, which are recognised as an expense in the period that relevant employee services are received.

3.10 Provisions, contingent liabilities and contingent assets

Provisions are measured at the estimated expenditure required to settle the present obligation, based on the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date, including the risks and uncertainties associated with the present obligation. Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. Provisions are discounted to their present values, where the time value of money is material.

3 Summary of accounting policies continued

3.12 Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST components of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

3.13 Economic dependence

The association is dependent upon the ongoing receipt of Federal and State Government grants and community and corporate donations to ensure the ongoing continuance of its programs and fundraising. At the date of this report Management has no reason to believe that this financial support will not continue.

3.14 Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

Estimation uncertainty

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

Impairment

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cashgenerating unit based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

Useful lives of depreciable assets

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain assets.

3.14 Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies continued

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

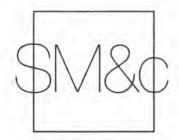
