At Sydney Catholic Schools (SCS), we believe in the transformative power of education rooted in faith and community.

Our network of 147 primary and secondary schools within the Archdiocese of Sydney is more than just a collection of campuses. It's a dynamic, thriving community where students are inspired to reach their full potential and to lead with purpose and compassion.

Our schools are places of growth, where dedicated teachers, supportive families, and passionate staff work hand-in-hand to create environments that foster learning, belonging, and faith. We are committed to guiding each child on a journey of academic, spiritual and personal discovery.

At the heart of our mission is a commitment to academic excellence, grounded in the teachings of Christ and enriched by diverse learning experiences that embrace each child's unique talents, providing opportunities for personal growth.

From foundational literacy and numeracy in Kindergarten to outstanding achievements in NAPLAN and the HSC, our students are challenged and supported to become confident, capable, and intellectually curious learners.

In 2024, six of our schools ranked among the top 53 high-achieving NSW schools in NAPLAN. These schools consistently achieved above-average scores in reading, writing, spelling, grammar, and numeracy across all year groups tested when compared to students from similar socio-educational backgrounds.

HSC results were also impressive. Over half (51.4%) of all subject results were in the top two bands (5 and 6), with six schools featuring among the top 100 in the state and 13 in the top 150. Eight of our exceptional students were honoured with First in Course distinctions, and a record 280 nominations were received for HSC showcases in Arts, Technology, and Applied Studies.

We are proud to see our students excel academically while staying true to our core values of faith, community, and service. Through their achievements, they carry forward the Sydney Catholic Schools legacy of an enduring commitment to nurturing bright minds and compassionate hearts.



Sydney Catholic Schools entered the next phase of its 200-year journey in 2024 with a period of transition in the executive leadership team.





FAITH FORMATION

MISSION AND IDENTITY

Our schools are holistic, faith-filled educational communities that respect tradition while learning in a contemporary environment. The cornerstone of our Mission and Identity is the Archbishop's Charter for Catholic Schools which calls us to:

- > Give witness to their distinctive educational, spiritual, moral and social purposes within the evangelising mission of the Church, founded on faith in Jesus Christ, and express this in a Mission Statement that identifies their traditions and charisms
- Nurture students' love of learning through a Catholic pedagogy that fosters the development of the intellect, moral knowledge, understanding and reasoning in a relational, social and cultural context
- Assist students to know, understand and celebrate their Catholic faith through the implementation of the Religious Education Curriculum of the Archdiocese
- > Encourage students' participation in and commitment to the Catholic life of the school through prayer, meditation and involvement in the life of the parish including Sunday Eucharist
- > Teach students to know, understand and act on Catholic social teaching, in particular the 'preferential option for the poor', the obligation to be good stewards of God's creation, the recognition of universal human rights, and the responsibility of fostering peaceful relations among peoples
- > Care for students through an inclusive curriculum, pastoral care and student wellbeing policies and practices that are consistent with the mission of the Catholic school
- Sive priority to the enrolment of Catholic students
- > Work in partnership with and support parents as the primary educators of their children
- Provide a range of evangelising, catechising, and faith formation opportunities to enhance the witness and Catholic practice of staff, students and families
- > Employ staff who have the capacity and commitment to give Christian witness and contribute to the mission of the Church
- Work with parish priests in nurturing communities where the celebration of the Eucharist, Sacraments, Sacred Scripture, prayer and Catholic symbols support students in developing a personal relationship with Jesus





FAITH IN ACTION

YOUTH MINISTRY

Youth Ministry programs at Sydney Catholic Schools inspire students to grow in faith and live out the Gospel message of Jesus Christ. Strong partnerships provide students with a wide range of opportunities for service, leadership development, prayer, and worship. Our programs including retreats and immersion experiences foster a vibrant faith life and a strong sense of belonging within parishes and the broader community. The Pope Francis Award is an annual program that invites students in Years 6, 7, and 9 to actively live their faith by volunteering within their school and parish communities. Participants dedicate their time before and after school to community service projects that align with their personal strengths and passions.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND LEADERSHIP

Sydney Catholic Schools is committed to Religious Education as a scholastic discipline with the same rigour and expectations as other subjects within the curriculum. Our team of K-12 Religious Education Coordinators drive the curriculum and ensure the highest standard in contemporary teaching practices across our schools. Sydney Catholic Schools actively supports teachers and staff to lead responsibly and compassionately. Our 'Head, Heart, Hands' approach to staff faith formation engages them in prayer, dialogue and reflection, and active community service that supports those in need.



FAITH IN ART

CLANCY PRIZE

The Clancy Prize for Religious Art is a celebration of Catholic faith and tradition and artistic talent, open to all secondary students in the Archdiocese of Sydney.

In 2024, the theme 'Saints of Hope' saw students highlight the work and legacies of some of the Church's most influential figures.

Entries ranged from sculptures and paintings to mixed media, and were exhibited at the Australian Catholic University's McGlade Gallery in Strathfield and the Crypt at St Mary's Cathedral, Sydney.

CHRISTMAS STORY RELIGIOUS ART EXHIBITION AND COMPETITION

This is an annual competition and exhibition for Year 5 and Year 6 students in the Archdiocese of Sydney, and dioceses of Wollongong and Bathurst.

Students draw, paint, create, and write a short reflection on the Sacred Scripture of Advent and Christmas that connects them with the significance of the birth of Jesus to their own lives.

In 2024, students submitted more than 400 Christmas story artworks. There were **92** works selected for exhibition and **23** prize winners.

SCS educators possess a deep understanding of the curriculum and best teaching practices, supported by professional development and a data-driven approach. This collective effort ensures that every student receives the necessary challenge and support.

TEACHING TO THRIVE

A deep understanding of the curriculum and best-practice in education allows Sydney Catholic Schools' dedicated teachers to provide every student with the appropriate level of challenge and support.

This is paired with a deep knowledge of their subject areas and enhanced by a unified, system-wide approach to professional development. Combined with a data-driven approach, our staff work together to deliver exceptional educational outcomes for their students.



CURRICULUM AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Sydney Catholic Schools follows the NSW Education Standards Authority curriculum, with an additional Religious Education component.

Strong literacy and numeracy foundations are essential for academic success across subjects.


As a Registered Training Organisation, SCS offers more than 40 VET qualifications, including Certificate I, II, and III courses, as well as school-based apprenticeships and traineeships.

In 2024, over 2,600 students engaged in VET courses, acquiring industry-specific skills while earning dual accreditation towards the Record of School Achievement and Higher School Certificate.

SCS supports VET through Trade Training/Skills Centres and partnerships with TAFE, helping students develop technical skills and career readiness.

Through VET options at SCS, students can:

- > Kickstart their career
- > Explore industry areas and job roles
- > Develop their technical skills and knowledge
- Develop key skills and attributes for greater employability

DIVERSE LEARNING

We promote an inclusive approach to student learning. Recognising that students learn differently, we provide tailored learning opportunities with high expectations for learning growth. Our teachers collaborate with students, parents, carers and specialist staff to develop personalised plans for specific educational goals.

We also cater to the needs of gifted and high potential students, ensuring educational equity is achieved for all students across all stages of their schooling. Our Newman Selective Gifted Education Program is an international award-winning program. Participating schools offer a wide range of opportunities to meet the needs of gifted learners and support students' social and emotional needs. The program is currently delivered at 88 primary and secondary schools.

FACILITIES

INNOVATIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS

Sydney Catholic Schools invests in high-quality school facilities to enhance learning outcomes.

Modern classrooms are designed with flexible, collaborative spaces that support various teaching methods and foster creativity and teamwork. Outside the classroom, well-equipped laboratories, libraries, and recreational areas promote critical thinking, physical wellbeing, and community spirit.

The groundbreaking Sophia Program, developed with the University of Melbourne, empowers educators to optimise their use of learning spaces.

In 2024, four additional schools joined the program, enhancing teaching practices through professional development.




SCS' FIRST VERTICAL SCHOOL

The transformation of St Mary's Cathedral College into a dual-campus co-educational facility will bring Sydney Catholic Schools' first vertical school to life.

Located in Woolloomooloo, the nine-storey refurbished heritage-listed building will include contemporary secondary spaces, seminar areas and facilities for the performing arts.

With the completion of the William Street site, St Mary's Cathedral College will grow to accommodate 1400 students, enabling students from across the Archdiocese to take advantage of the high-quality education the College provides.



WELLBEING AND SUPPORT

Sydney Catholic Schools prioritises student wellbeing, recognising that positive wellbeing is fundamental to learning.

The 2024 Student Wellbeing Policy, based on the Australian Student Wellbeing Framework, emphasises leadership, inclusion, student voice, partnerships, and support. This approach ensures a safe, nurturing environment for students to thrive socially, emotionally, and academically.

In line with the Be You Framework, SCS takes a systematic approach to wellbeing, including whole-school programs, anti-bullying policies, counselling services, and targeted interventions.

In 2024, we also launched a parent wellbeing page on school websites to support families with practical resources.

Dedicated Family Support pages were also introduced on school websites to provide parents and carers with accessible, practical resources and links to community services and 24-hour helplines.







CATHOLIC EDUCATION FOUNDATION

The Catholic Education Foundation (CEF), our charitable arm, supports families in financial hardship to access quality Catholic education.

Since 2011, CEF has assisted nearly 42,000 students through bursaries and scholarships and now supports 8.5% of students attending Sydney Catholic Schools. In 2024, the CEF continued offering scholarships for high school graduates pursuing teaching careers at the Australian Catholic University and the University of Notre Dame, providing financial support, mentoring, and teaching opportunities.

Sydney Catholic Schools remains dedicated to fostering academic excellence and personal growth while maintaining a supportive and inclusive community for students and families.

In 2024, the City Link Mentor Program continued to change lives by pairing students from disadvantaged backgrounds with dedicated mentors who provide financial support, guidance, and real-world exposure.

Since 2015, nearly 200 students have benefitted from this unique combination of academic encouragement and personal connection, with many graduates now pursuing careers in fields such as medicine, law, education, and finance.



CREATIVE AND PERFORMING ARTS

Sydney Catholic Schools offers unparalleled creative arts opportunities that enrich student development, fostering confidence, critical thinking, and interpersonal skills.

The vibrant arts program encompasses Dance, Drama, Music, and Visual Arts through school-based activities, cross-curricular initiatives, and broader community collaborations. Key programs include the SCS Eisteddfod, Network Festival, Portrait Prize, and Songwriting Workshops, which enhance student engagement and showcase talent.

BENEFITS OF AN ARTS EDUCATION

The creative arts help students develop their confidence, self esteem and resilience, skills that will serve them well in all areas of their lives contributing to positive well being.

A quality arts education plays a crucial role in the holistic development of a student. It provides students with opportunities to express themselves and develop their creativity, imagination, and emotional intelligence. Studies have shown that participation in these activities can lead to improved academic performance, enhanced critical thinking and problem-solving skills, and better interpersonal skills.





CELEBRATING STUDENT TALENT

The 2024 SCS Eisteddfod saw significant growth, with 125 schools participating and more than 8,500 students performing across 22 days.

New performance sections included gospel choir and infants dance. The inclusion of Eileen O'Connor Catholic College students highlighted SCS's commitment to inclusivity.

2024 also saw significant growth in solo and ensemble performances, fostering both individual and group artistic expression.

ARTS HQ 2024 HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights from 2024:

- Annual eisteddfod, HSC Performing Arts Showcase, and Imagination Ball featured performances alongside industry and artists in residence like professionals like Rachael Beck.
- > The Artists' Evolution program students participated in the Sydney Festival's Nightsongs at Coney Island Exquisite, directed by Opera Australia's Troy Honeysett and Matthew Barclay.
- An expanded Visual Arts programs included a live exhibition at the Australian Catholic University (ACU) McGlade Gallery and workshops for elective and senior students.
- > Sculpture by the Schools won the *People's Choice Litterarty Award* at the Bondi Ocean Lover's Festival for the second consecutive year.
- > The Regional Arts Exchange showcased collaborative sculptures from dioceses across Sydney, Lismore, and Maitland Newcastle.

CELEBRATIONS OF CREATIVITY

The inaugural Network Festival brought together talent from 90 schools with over 2,165 performers across five days, celebrating Drama, Music, Dance, and Visual Arts. The festival emphasized community-building and accessibility, giving many students their first opportunity to perform on stage.

The Murrawadeen Goodjarga program empowers First Nations students by connecting them to their cultural heritage through storytelling, Dance, Drama, Music, and Visual Arts. In 2024, the dance ensemble performed a contemporary piece at the Network Festival, showcasing Indigenous culture through creative expression.







AMADEUS PROGRAM

In 2024, Sydney Catholic Schools proudly completed the three-year rollout of the Amadeus Music Education Program, reaffirming our commitment to innovative and equitable education for all students.

The program integrates music education into the curriculum for Years 3 to 8, offering small group tuition and ensemble participation. Students gain hands-on experience with string, woodwind, and brass instruments, guided by professional tutors from prestigious musical backgrounds.

SPORT FOR ALL: NURTURING GROWTH THROUGH PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

At Sydney Catholic Schools, we believe that sport and physical activity are essential for every student, playing a vital role in their development and well-being. Through sport, students not only enhance their social and cognitive skills but also build resilience and positive mental health, contributing to improved academic performance and personal growth.

Our approach to co-curricular sport is guided by a commitment to inclusivity and excellence. Our dedicated teachers work closely with industry experts and sporting associations to offer diverse opportunities, from elite athletic pathways to non-competitive, fun-filled events. One of our most celebrated initiatives is the Unified All Abilities Interschool Sports Program, which marked its third year in 2024. Unique within Australian school networks, this program brings together students with and without disabilities to participate in sports such as goalball and sitting volleyball. By fostering inclusivity, we create spaces where every student can experience the joy of sport and feel valued as part of a team.

A COMPREHENSIVE SPORT STRUCTURE

Students at SCS can participate in a wide range of competitive sports, both within the Archdiocese of Sydney and across New South Wales. For those with exceptional talent, there are opportunities to trial for higher-level representation, opening pathways to development camps, further training, and state and national competitions. We also encourage broader participation through our School Holiday Sports Program, offering students a chance to experience the physical, mental, and social benefits of sport during term breaks.

COMMUNITY AND CELEBRATION

In 2024, our commitment to sharing the excitement of sport with families and the community was brought to life through five live-streamed events: the Summer, Autumn, and Winter Championships, as well as the Swimming and Athletics Championships. These events not only showcased the skills and spirit of our students but also allowed parents and carers to share in the thrill of competition. For the first time in 2024, a team of 20 First Nations students from SCS secondary schools played in the seventh annual Bennelong Cup and progressed to the grand final. The team competed under the name Warrane, the local Indigenous word for Sydney Cove, and attended an Indigenous careers workshop and luncheon after the day's play. At Sydney Catholic Schools, sport is more than just physical activity. It's a pathway to personal growth, teamwork, and lifelong health. We are proud to offer inclusive and enriching experiences that help students thrive both on and off the field.




