

1. REPORTING ENTITY

Sydney Adventist Hospital Foundation Trust (the "Trust") is a Not-for-Profit organisation domiciled in Australia. The address of the Trust's registered office is 185 Fox Valley Road, Wahroonga, NSW, 2076. The principal object of the Trust is to provide for a public charitable fund having deductible gift recipient status to which donations may be made for distribution to the beneficiary. The sole beneficiary as listed in clause 1.1 of the trust deed is Adventist Healthcare Limited ABN 76 096 452 925 (formerly known as Sydney Adventist Hospital Ltd). In the opinion of the Directors, the Trust is not a reporting entity on the basis that the financial report is prepared for the benefit of the Directors.

Date of Settlement

The Trust is constituted by The Sydney Adventist Hospital Foundation Trust Deed between Australasian Conference Association Limited as Founder and San Foundation Inc. as Trustee.

Settled Sum

The sum of \$1 was remitted to San Foundation Inc. (the "Trustee") by the settlor on the date of settlement for the purposes of the Trust.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

Statement of Compliance

The financial report is a special purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commissions Regulations, the provisions of the trust deed and with the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and its regulations. For the purpose of preparing the financial statements the Trust is a not-for-profit entity.

The special purpose financial statements include only the disclosure requirements of the following AASBs and those disclosures considered necessary by the directors to meet the needs of the members:

Comparative Information

The prior year comparatives are for the period 27 June 2017 to 30 June 2018.

The reason for a longer prior comparative period is due to a resolution by the San Foundation Board to use a financial year end of 30 June for the 2018 financial year end and each financial year end thereafter. This means comparative amounts for the income statement, statement of changes in equity, cash flow statement and related notes may not be entirely comparable.

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial report has been prepared on the basis of historical cost, except for the revaluation of certain non-current assets and financial instruments. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets. All amounts are presented in Australian dollars, unless otherwise noted.

The following significant accounting policies have been adopted in the preparation and presentation of the financial report:

a. Income Tax

The Trust is exempt from income tax as a charitable entity under subdivision 50-B of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

b. Fundraising income

Revenue arising from fundraising appeals and other donations, including bequests, is recognised when the Trust receives the monies or where the Trust has a unconditional commitment from the contributor, on an accruals basis.

Pledges received for donations that are to be made over a number of years are recognised as revenue in the relevant year that the donation is received.

The Trust has applied AASB 1058 Income of Not-For-Profit Entities when recognising fundraising income. Fundraising income was received for no consideration to further the objectives of San Foundation Inc.

Rendering of services

San Foundation Inc. earns entrant fees and sponsorship revenues for the annual Run for Life event. Revenues from services are recognised when the service is performed (the date of the event). Entrant fees and sponsorships received prior to the event are recognised as a "sufficiently specific performance obligation" under AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers and recognised as an other payable in the financial statements.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method.

c. Operating expenses

Operating expenses are recognised in profit and loss upon utilisation of the service or at the date of their origin.

d. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash comprises cash on hand and demand deposits. Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

e. Goods and services tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except for receivables and payables which are recognised inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables.

Cash flows are included in the cash flow statement on a net basis. The GST component of the cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

f. Financial Assets

Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables that have fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market are classified as 'trade and other receivables'. Trade and other receivables are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment.

Investments

The Trusts investments are categorised as held at fair value through profit or loss. These are initially recognised mandatorily at fair value through the profit or loss plus directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The Trust has no power or control over its investments and therefore the investments would not be consolidated in the Trust financial statements.

Impairment of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those at fair value through profit or loss, are assessed for indicators of impairment at each balance sheet date. Financial assets are impaired where there is objective evidence that as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset the estimated future cash flows of the investment have been impacted.

An impairment loss is calculated as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. Losses are recognised in profit or loss and reflected in an allowance account. When the Trust considers there are no realistic prospects of recovery of the asset, the relevant amounts are written off. If the amount of the impairment loss subsequently decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, then the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through profit and loss.

g. Financial instruments issued by the Trust

Trade and other payables

Trade payables are recognised initially at their fair value, which is the amount expected to be paid, and subsequently at amortised cost. These amounts represent liabilities for services provided prior to the end of the period which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Other payables are accruals for services provided in relation to the period.

h. New standards and interpretations

AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities

AASB 1058 clarifies and simplifies the income recognition requirements that apply to Not-for-Profit entities, in conjunction with AASB 15. AASB 1058 supersedes all the income recognition requirements relating to private sector Not-for-Profit entities, and the majority of income recognition requirements relating to public sector Not-for-Profit entities previously in AASB 1004 Contributions. The requirements of AASB 1058 more closely reflect the economic reality of Not-For-Profit entity transactions that are not contracts with customers.

AASB 1058 is effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019. The Trust has elected to adopt AASB 1058 early for the year ended 30 June 2019.

The impact on its financial statements resulting in adjustments to revenue and other payables for entrant fees and sponsorships for the 2018 Run for Life event. 2018 comparatives have been adjusted as follows:

AASB 16 Leases

AASB 16 Leases introduces a single on-balance sheet accounting model for leases. A lessee recognises a right-of-use asset representing its right to use the underlying asset and a lease liability representing its obligation to make lease payments.

In FY19, the Trust paid Adventist Healthcare Limited to occupy an office at 185 Fox Valley Road, Wahroonga. San Foundation Inc. and Adventist Healthcare Limited are working together to establish a memorandum of understanding with an intent to finalise an agreement by 30 June 2020. The current draft memorandum of understanding proposes the provision of an office by Adventist Healthcare Limited to San Foundation Inc. for fundraising activities at nil cost.

The Trust has elected to use the short term exemption under AASB 16 Leases. The lease has been accounted for as such recognising the lease expense as payments made and no future provision.

Report on the audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the **Financial Report** of Sydney Adventist Hospital Foundation Trust (the Trust).

In our opinion, the accompanying Financial Report of the Trust is in accordance with Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) Act 2012*, Section 24(2) of the *Charitable Fundraising (NSW) Act 1991* and Regulations including:

- giving a true and fair view of the Trust's financial position as at 30 June 2019, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year ended on that date; and
- complying with *Australian Accounting Standards* to the extent described in Note 2 and the Division 60 of the *Australia Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013*.

The **Financial Report** comprises:

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with *Australian Auditing Standards*. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the Financial Report* section of our report.

We are independent of the Trust in accordance with the auditor independence requirements of the *ACNC Act 2012* and the ethical requirements of the *Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the Financial Report in Australia. We have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

Emphasis of matter – basis of preparation and restriction on use

We draw attention to Note 2 to the Financial Report, which describes the basis of preparation.

The Financial Report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Directors' financial reporting responsibilities under the *ACNC Act 2012* and *Charitable Fundraising (NSW) Act 1991*. As a result, the Financial Report and this Auditor's Report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Our report is intended solely for the Trustee of the Trust and ACNC and should not be used by any other party. We disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this Auditor's report, or on the Financial Report to which it relates, to any person other than the Trustee of the Trust and ACNC.

Other Information

Other Information is financial and non-financial information in Sydney Adventist Hospital Foundation Trust's annual reporting which is provided in addition to the Financial Report and the Auditor's Report. The Directors are responsible for the Other Information.

Our opinion on the Financial Report does not cover the Other Information and, accordingly, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the Financial Report, our responsibility is to read the Other Information. In doing so, we consider whether the Other Information is materially inconsistent with the Financial Report or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

We are required to report if we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this Other Information, and based on the work we have performed on the Other Information that we obtained prior to the date of this Auditor's Report we have nothing to report.

Responsibilities of the Trustee for the Financial Report

The Trustee is responsible for:

- Preparing the Financial Report that gives a true and fair view in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and the ACNC.
- Preparing the Financial Report in accordance with Section 24(2) of the *Charitable Fundraising (NSW) Act 1991* and Regulations.
- Determining that the basis of preparation described in Notes 2 to the Financial Report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the ACNC, and the *Charitable Fundraising (NSW) Act 1991*. The basis of preparation is also appropriate to meet the needs of the members.
- Implementing necessary internal control to enable the preparation of a Financial Reports that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
- Assessing the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern. This includes disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless they either intend to liquidate the Trust or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the Financial Report

Our objective is:

- to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the Financial Report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; and
- to issue an Auditor's Report that includes our opinion.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with *Australian Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error. They are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the Financial Report.

As part of an audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit.

We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the Financial Report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the Audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the registered Trust's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Directors.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the Directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the registered Trust's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our Auditor's Report to the related disclosures in the Financial Report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our Auditor's Report. However, future events or conditions may cause the registered Trust to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the Financial Report, including the disclosures, and whether the Financial Report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Directors of the Trust regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

In addition we have:

- Obtained an understanding of the internal control structure for fundraising appeal activities.



- Examined on a test basis of evidence supporting compliance with the accounting and associated record keeping requirements for fundraising appeal activities pursuant to the Acts and Regulations.

We have not audited on a continuous basis the accounting records relied upon for reporting on fundraising appeal activities. These do not necessarily reflect accounting adjustments after the event or normal period-end financial adjustments required for the preparation of Financial Report such as accruals, prepayments, provisioning and valuations.

Report on other legal and regulatory requirements

In our opinion:
