SECTION 2 GOVERNANCE

STRUCTURE & MANAGEMENT

Kids Outreach International Ltd is a public company limited by guarantee registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC).

KOI operates with very small staff consisting of the Executive Director and one support staff to coordinate and manage activities.

The Executive Director reports to a board elected by the members.

The majority of the hands-on activities are performed by self-funded volunteers.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

For KOI, 2018 has been a year following of stabilisation and small steps towards the future. Here are the key points:

- The LFKR camp ministry, while with fewer teams than before, has impacted 1935 children in 10 camps in Russia.
- In the wake of Fida's withdrawal in 2016, the KOI takeover of the responsible role for all participants in the Love for Kids Russia project has been successful, and the camp project has remained at a steady level in 2018.
- 2019 will still provide challenges in recruiting suitable volunteers for the ongoing work in the Russian camps.
- Real Help for People has stabilised, and KOI has established a new cooperation agreement for going forward. This new agreement will maintain similar arrangements to agreement with Fida.
- The tripartite agreement between The Russian Parents' and Children's Association, Real Help for People and Fida (under with KOI operated) came to an end this year. From 2019, agreements will be made directly between the individual camps and Real Help for People for KOI teams to visit camps under the KOI Real Help for People cooperation agreement.
- The project in partnership with the Estonian Pentecostal church completed its second year, participating in Russian and Estonian language camps, and assisting children's work in several regional towns and villages with local churches.
- Family Homes for Orphans (FH4O) project has raised funds project families in the Far-East of Russia and has a small balance \$2,119 for future work. KOI will continue to support this project financially.
- The Campus Connexions project has started to revive. Although we did not host any seminars in 2018 as hoped, relationships are still strong and discussions will commence in 2019 for new seminars.
- Samaria's Rose Project has continued strongly providing care for several victims in the Rose Home in Finland. KOI has continued to actively seek funds to support this work.

While the year finished with a small operating surplus, KOI remains financially stable.

Love for Kids – Russia outreach

Step Up to the Mission

Love for Kids – Russia is a cultural exchange project recruiting volunteer Christians to spend a couple of weeks at children's summer camps in Russia. There has also been a team going to a rehabilitation centre in Vladivostok. Main areas of outreach have been St. Petersburg, Novosibirsk, Suzun and Vladivostok.

Teams take part in a camp's regular programme and also provide their own cultural and spiritual programmes based on Christian principles. All the programmes run or literature distributed are all approved by the camp director beforehand.

Step Up to the Mission is a sister project aimed to challenge youth to take part in the mission.

The following official programmes were all well received by camps:

- preventative dental
- preventative substance abuse
- healthy relationships
- Be Smart, Be Safe, anti-human trafficking
- Keep Kids Safe, child safety

Six teams from Australia and three from Finland were in St. Petersburg, Vladivostok, Suzun and Novosibirsk. One person from USA took part in a work in an orphanage in Vyborg area.

StepUp Against Slavery

StepUp Against Slavery (SUAS) is a project focused on anti human trafficking and delivers preventative and awareness programmes especially at children's summer camps in Russia. Be Smart, Be Safe programme is run at camps to teenagers, girls and boys over 12 years old and Keep Kids Safe programme for kids under 12.

SUAS works in conjunction with Samaria's Rose Project in Finland supporting victims of sex trafficked women.

Rose Home is a place for recovery of rescued victims of sex trafficking. Victims come from Finland's victim assistance system and the cost of care is funded by the Finnish Government.

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Notes to, and forming part of, the Financial Statements

1. Statement of significant accounting policies

This financial report covers Kids Outreach International Limited as an individual entity. Kids Outreach International Limited is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee under the Companies Act.

Basis of preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, and the requirements of the Companies Act.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has conducted would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of this financial report are presented below. They have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

(a) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amounts from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings is depreciated on a diminishing value basis over their useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Kids Outreach International Limited

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Gains and losses on disposal are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. The gains and losses are included in the income statement. When revalued assets are sold, amount included in the revaluation relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

(b) Impairment of assets

At each reporting date, the company reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

(c) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year have been measured at their nominal amount. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

(d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

(e) Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(f) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

(g) Comparative figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(h) Rounding of amounts

Amounts in the financial report and directors' report have been rounded to the nearest \$1.
